Title: #3 The Spirit-Filled Church

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ACTS 2:1-13

[INTRODUCTION]

- Have you ever followed Jesus so hard people thought you were drunk?
 - That's what happens to the disciples in our passage.
 - Talk about going deeper, talk about outside people—they live lives that can only be explained by the Spirit of God.
- Maybe you know people like that—you don't think they're drunk, but you know they're different—sold out for Jesus.
 - They come alive in worship, have deep friendships, serve generously—and even share their faith.
 - o There's something alive, joyful, and compelling about them.
- But you're not quite sure how to tap into that—maybe you even feel a little stuck:
 - Still wrestling with the same old problems or sins.
 - o Following Jesus, but without much passion or joy.
 - Certainly not doing anything as bold as telling others about him.
- I think the first disciples would understand:
 - o Jesus had given them a mission: Be my witnesses to the ends of the earth.
 - Show the world that there's a new king, and in his kingdom everything on earth can be as it is in heaven.
 - Forgiveness is real, hope is alive, healing is possible—and the best is yet to come.
 - The disciples had the mission: But how on earth were they supposed to live like that?!
- Well, in our passage this morning, everything changes.
 - The sound of rushing wind, the sight of tongues of fire...
 - God sends his Spirit, enabling his people to live alive for him—because now they have the presence, power, and purpose of the king.

[Transition]: Let's start with his presence.

1. YOU ARE ALIVE WITH GOD'S PRESENCE

[State]

- In **V1** we once again find the disciples all together in one place—fellowship, community, togetherness is normative in the Xn life.
- Then, **V2**: Suddenly there came from heaven a sound like a mighty rushing wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting.
 - o When was the last time you witnessed a great storm?

- This summer Rosie and I drove to Colorado, and somewhere in Kansas—we drove into one: Sheet lightning across the sky, rain so heavy we could hardly see, wind so strong trucks pulled off the road.
- It was wild, and terrifying, and awesome.
- Now imagine that storm not outside—but inside a room...
 - The disciples aren't in Kansas—they're in a home!
 - And a mighty rushing wind consumes them. Then...
- **V3**: Divided tongues as of fire appeared to them and rested on each one of them.
 - Out of the wind, flames spiral—and then settle on each believer.
 - o What's happening here? It's the **presence** of God.
 - o In the **OT**—wind and fire were familiar signs of God's presence.
 - Wind: God's Spirit hovered over the waters at creation (Gen 1); God's breath gave life to dry bones (Eze 37).
 - **Fire:** God appeared in a pillar of fire (Ex 13:21); to Moses in the burning bush (Ex 3:2).
 - But notice the difference: The wind doesn't hover over the waters, and the fire doesn't burn within a bush—instead, they rest on each believer.

[Illustrate]: The Spirit does not just fill a place—he fills a people.

- As Tim Keller once said: "Every believer is now a burning bush."
- If you're a Xn, the HS lives in you—you are alive with the presence of God.

[Apply]: Be encouraged, dear ones—we are never alone.

- Do you need that reminder this week?
 - o When you feel isolated or overwhelmed, when you feel angry or confused...
 - Never forget that God is with you.
 - In the **mundane** tasks—driving, cooking, parenting, working...
 - In the dramatic moments:
 - In your **personal** life—your broken marriage, your unwelcome diagnosis, your financial stress.
 - Or in the awful events that have unfolded in our **nation** these past few weeks...
 - We put out a podcast this week in response to the evil assassination of Charlie Kirk.
 - It's important that we speak publicly on this and consider how Christ would have us think and act.
 - Encourage you to check it out if you've not yet had the chance.
 - But in all these things—personal and cultural—remember: God is with you every step.
- To quote **Frederick Buechner**: "Here is the world. Beautiful and terrible things will happen. Don't be afraid."²
- Why not? Because you're navigating it all with the **presence** of God.

[Transition]

- Well, yes, someone says, that is encouraging, but can we get more concrete? What difference does God's presence make?
- Let's answer that by seeing how God's **presence** with us brings God's **power** to us.
- You are alive with God's presence, and...

2. YOU ARE ALIVE WITH GOD'S POWER

[State]

- What kind of power are we talking about?
- R. C. Sproul once answered this question by explaining the biblical imagery of fire:
 - Why is the Spirit symbolized through fire?
 - o Because in the OT, Sproul says, fire brought two things:3

1) First, LIGHT.

- In our electrified age, we take light for granted—we can flick the switch and have light any time of day.
- But for most of human history, it wasn't so: Once the sun went down you needed fire—candles and torches—to see.
- o In the same way, one of the most important operations of the Spirit is that he gives us the power to see.
 - As the pillar of fire guided the people in Exodus...
 - So the Holy Spirit leads and guides us today.
 - He opens our **eyes** to see our need of God (Jn 16:8).
 - He opens our **hearts** to understand his word (Jn 16:13).
 - He guides our steps so we can live as he's called (Gal 5:25).
- o Without the Spirit we stumble in the dark—but with him we see.

[Apply]: Where do you turn when you need light?

- o When you're lost or confused or you don't know what to do?
 - Social media, cable news, an influencer, ChatGPT?
 - Or do you ask the Spirit for light?
 - We bring our questions and decisions to him.
 - Praying through them and trusting he'll guide at every turn.
- We are not a rudderless people—we have the power of light.

2) Second, fire also brings HEAT.

- Again, it's easy to forget about this in our electrified age—we can change the temperature any time we want.
- But for most of human history people built fires to keep warm.
- In the same way, one of the most important operations of the Spirit is to warm our hearts to God.

- Scripture says he does this by pouring God's love into our hearts (Rom 5:5).
- He takes the facts—of sin and grace, of Jesus and his cross—and transforms them into conviction and burning affection.
- o Without the Spirit we're lukewarm—but with him we're on fire for God.

[Apply]: Where are you tempted to turn when you need warmth?

- o Where do you go to feel alive?
 - Your family, work, hobby, politics, another drink, porn?
 - Or do you ask the Spirit for heat?
 - Till he pours God's love into your heart.
 - Till you're ablaze—on fire for God…
- We are not a passionless people—we have the power of heat.

[Illustrate]

- On a cold night, fire does two things: it lets you see clearly and warms your body.
- That's the power the Spirit brings to us: clarity of mind, warmth of heart—a people of light and heat.

[Apply]: And that's a powerful combination:

- In our world today—there's not enough light, and there's too much unhealthy heat.
- But what a people we could be:
 - o A people of light—who see clearly.
 - o And a people of heat—who love deeply.
- Let's measure our words and actions by these questions:
 - Am I seeing things as God sees them?
 - o Am I loving as God loves me?
- The Spirit gives us power to be people of light and heat.

[Transition]: But let's go one step farther...

- With this power, what difference should we make?
- Let's answer that by seeing that God's presence gives us power for a purpose.
- You are alive with God's presence; You are alive with God's power, and...

3. YOU ARE ALIVE WITH GOD'S PURPOSE

[State]

- In chp 1 Jesus told the disciples to be his witnesses.
- Now in **chp 2** he empowers them to do the thing he's commanded them to do.
 - o In **V4** the HS fills them and enables them to speak in other languages they've never learned.
 - Note two things:

1) First, who hears:

- ⁹ Parthians and Medes and Elamites and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, ¹⁰ Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, ¹¹ both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabians.
- In other words, the nations of the earth!
 - God's people do not come from one nation, tribe, people, or language.
 - God does not show partiality to any country—he came to save the entire world.
- Now that global ingathering begins.
 - The fact that it happens on Pentecost is significant.
 - Pentecost was a festival that celebrated the first fruits of the harvest—that initial batch that showed you more was to come.
 - Here God gathers the first fruits of his global community—that initial batch that shows there's more to come.
 - That great multitude that no one can number, from every nation, tribe, people and language...
 - That will one day stand before the throne.

2) Second, note what the disciples say:

- It's easy to get so caught up in the miracle of tongues that we miss what they had to say.
- But V11 tells us—in many languages they had one message.
 - Do you see it there?
 - They all spoke about the mighty works of God.
- I can't tell you how much I love this:
 - The HS didn't empower them to declare what their listeners had to do: Try harder. Be better. Get your act together. Improve.
 - Instead, the HS empowers them to declare good news.
 - · God has done amazing things.
 - Now he's sent his Son in love.
 - He died for your sins, but God raised him up...
 - If you believe in him—you'll be forgiven and live.
- In summary: They declare the mighty works of God to a world in desperate need.
 - o That is the **purpose** of the **power** God gives us through his **presence**.
 - Declare the mighty works of God to a world in desperate need.

[Illustrate]: What does this mean for us?

- The Spirit may not enable us to speak languages we've never studied, as he did at Pentecost—this was a one-time event to show us his purposes.
- But the Sprit does equip us to speak boldly of Jesus.

To declare the mighty works of God to a world in desperate need.

[Apply]

- What would it look like if we did that this week?
 - o Who in your life needs to hear it?
 - o Will you tell them?
 - Not to try harder. Be better. Get your act together. Improve.
 - But the good news: the mighty works of God.
- If the last few weeks have shown us anything, it's that our world is still in desperate need.
 - The world needs the light of the gospel and the warmth it brings.
 - o The world needs us to witness to the love and power of our king.

[THE CLOSE]

- And don't miss the encouragement we get in the final verse.
 - The Spirit descends, they speak in miraculous languages, they declare the mighty works of God—and what happens?
 - Some respond in awe, but others mock.
 - Some get it. Some don't. But all hear.
 - It's not the disciples' job to change hearts—it's just their job to speak.
- It's the same for us:
 - o You don't need a fancy argument, and you don't need all the answers.
 - You just need to tell others what God has done for you.
- Whatever you say:
 - o Some will get it. Some won't. But through you, they can hear.
 - o It's not our job to change hearts—it's just our job to speak.

[CONCLUSION]

- Have you ever followed Jesus so hard people thought you were drunk?
 - We have the presence of God with us.
 - We have the power of God in us.
 - We have the purpose of God through us.
- Go live a life that can only be explained by the Spirit of God.

That's the church at its best—A spirit-filled community of witnesses to Christ.

[PRAYER]

- Put one person on our hearts.
- Give us the opportunity to speak.
- We resolve now to take it.
